

SUMMER SIEGE ONCE AGAIN PREPARES the Skrael army for war season

It was a drizzly day for a siege, but that didn't dampen the spirits of the hearty folk who made the trek down to Chesterville for this year's event.

This year, Summer Siege was held at a new location. For the first two years, the event had been run at Grant Mor farm in Monkland to great success. This year, Harrowgate Heath tried a new location at the Chesterville Farmer's Market.

In addition to archery, thrown weapons, armoured combat and rapier, this year's event had the added bonus of a full feast cooked by Herr Reinhart Von Altenburg – including a pig roast.

The venue also had the added advantage of having indoor facilities, which given the rain was a blessing.

Outside in the intermittent rain, the armoured combatants ran the traditional castle siege with a variety of scenarios taking place.

A triathlon tournament was also held, with participants taking part in three activities over the course of the day (A&S, armoured comrapier).

During the day, Their Excellencies Lucia and Giovanni also oversaw

bat, archery, thrown weapons and two Baronial Champions tourneys, with both a new thrown weapon's champion and a new youth boffer champion selected.

SCA CENSUS RESULTS START TRICKLING IN

The results from the 2010 SCA census have started to be released, and while some of the most interesting sections are still pending, there is lots of important information now available.

In all, over 14,000 people participated in the survey, including 367 people from Ealdormere. This includes current participants in SCA activities (both members and nonmembers) as well as former participants.

The first release of data, which was published in July, covered basic demographic information such as where people are from, their education and income levels and age and gender breakdowns.

It also covered information about people's level of participation, events they attend and activities they like to do within the SCA.

There's also interesting data on what attracted people to the SCA in the first place, and where relevant, why people stopped participating. A special section on people's opinion related to eNewsletters was also included.

Down the road, additional releases will include more detailed analysis as well as data related to specific questions, such as those related to additional peerage options and same gender consorts.

A Window on the Census

Here are some key statistics from the 2010 SCA census.

83 per cent of respondents were active participants in SCA activities.

94 per cent of respondents had some form of post-secondary education

80 per cent of respondents have been active in the SCA for five or more years, with the largest single group (21 per cent) having been in the SCA for 20 to 29 years.

Of the almost 3000 former participants who responded, what would have the greatest impact on bringing them back would be better events (cheaper, closer to home, more fun etc.) and outreach from the local group inviting them back.

65 per cent of people found out about the SCA from a friend, acquaintance or family member (parents, spouse etc.)

72 per cent of people said they would be interested in receiving an electronic Kingdom newsletter, either instead of (41.3 per cent) or in addition to (31.1 per cent) hard copies. 22.8 per cent said they would not be interested in electronic newsletters.

In Ealdormere, 84.5 per cent wanted electronic newsletters in some form, while 14.6 per cent did not.

Avelyn's Book Nook

Queen Emma and the Vikings: The Woman Who Shaped the Events of 1066

The formidable Emma of Normandy is not a lady that jumps to mind immediately when recalling the illustrious legacy of English queens.

However, Harriet O'Brien takes reminds us in *Queen Emma* just what kind of influence and impact this one woman had on the foundations of Norman and Scandinavian rule in England.

Brought to England from the shores of Normandy as a young girl, Emma became the second wife of the first king of England, Æthelred.

Over the years, her role transformed from silent witness of court business to become a powerful mother of two kings of England, and twice queen herself.

After the death of Æthelred, Emma was claimed as bride by the incoming Viking conqueror, Cnut of Denmark.

O'Brien narrates the warp and weft of Emma's tale of her marriages, children, a kingdom at war, and her periods of exile with a balanced perspective. She deftly surmises rationale for the choices Emma makes in her lifetime, based on interpreting the existing extant documents available.

In doing so, Emma blooms into life as a capable woman who had no qualms using her wit, whiles and determination to navigate the tumultuous period in English history that saw the intersection and divide of a nation transitioning through three distinctive dynasties of rule.

The author doesn't skirt the fact that Emma appears to have made some hard decisions along the way, such that O'Brien describes her as "Machiavellian".

She abandons her sons from Æthelstan, including Edward the Confessor, into exile in Normandy while she marries Cnut and works with him to reign in the chaos of administration that followed his coronation.

After Cnut's death, she fights to put her son Harthacnut into the throne, only to have to later appeal to Edward to fill the void after Harthacnut's untimely demise.

Queen Emma is an interesting read beyond the facts themselves, because of the careful and methodical approach O'Brien uses to sift through the details of Emma's life. Her extensive research is inspira-

tional. Refreshing too is seeing the story of a medieval woman in a position of such power unfold. Grab a glass of wine and curl up with this one. (Bloomsbury, 2006)
